Reflections on how to give a good homily

As we approach the task of preaching, we must keep in mind that the Word of God is a banquet and not fast food. "Long" and "short" are relative terms and need to be discerned in light of our own church cultures and practices. I preach on Sundays for fifteen to 20 minutes, and I make no apology for this. The ministry of preaching is key, and we should take it seriously. It's the biggest bang for our buck in ministry and we need to do it well. I do not believe that the people in our pews who are truly hungry for God's Word can get enough nourishment or the week ahead of them if they are only being served up fiveminute homiletic hors d';oeuvres. A commitment o more robust and intentional preaching will be favorably received by those who are hungry, but there will be pushback from those who have no hunger. In all of our churches, a portion of the congregation would rejoice if we announced that we were committing to five-minute Sunday homilies.

MIND, HEART and WILL

When we preach, we need to be intentional about speaking to the entire person - mind, heart, conscience and will. Our preaching should be intelligent and informative, but not come across as an academic lecture. Preachers will always have to resist the temptation to show how smart they are or to demonstrate all the big words they learned while studying theology. To speak to the heart means seeking to move people emotionally. We have hungry, restless hearts, and they cry out to be given the rest that only God can give. It is Good News we preach, so the one emotion that should be experienced through our preaching is joy! If we are truly to speak to the whole person, we cannot stop at the mind and the heart, but must seek to cut into the heart as well, so that it leads to action. In this, the preacher also speaks to the will, as fruitful preaching will lead people to make a decision, a choice.

Pope Paul VI said that our contemporaries no longer listen to teachers, but to witnesses. People desire authenticity. The first question our people are asking when we begin a homily is this; is he real? Is he loving? If there is any hint that we are not being authentic in our preaching, or are hiding something, or are using the homily as a kind of safe intellectual exercise, our words will not penetrate. Our preaching may be informative but it will not be transformative. Theolgian Karl Barth once said that preachers should prepare their homilies with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other. Priests must be aware of the issue their people bring with them to Mass.

Many would say that we now exist in a post-aural culture. We are audio-visual learners. It's just the way it is. It is unthinkable that a lecturer would present anywhere these days and not have something on a screen. Young people are constantly stimulated by visuals through their hours in front of a television, computer or smartphone screen. Why then would we not seek to do the same thing when communicating the greatest story and the best news of all?

As a member of a colonized people, Gandhi certainly saw the worst of what Christians are capable of. But his statement isn't entirely a rebuke—Christ spoke to his heart. Jesus told us that we will be recognized as his disciples by our love for one another. Ask yourself how well you represent your faith.

A love that works

At the height of the Industrial Revolution, impoverished Italian boys were drawn to the city of Turin in search of factory work. But, for many reasons, they fell on hard times and were often jailed. Saint John Bosco helped them with lodging, education, vocational training, and just plain patience and loving care. He also protected young workers from unscrupulous employers by crafting signed apprenticeship agreements—the first real employment contracts used in Europe. He revolutionized the work of educators, too, writing: "Without confidence and love, there can be no true education. If you want to be loved ... you must love yourselves, and make your children feel that you love them."

Make a perfect offering of your life

Today's feast marks an ancient Jewish tradition in which the firstborn child was "consecrated to the Lord" by way of two sacrificial turtledoves or young pigeons offered at the Temple 40 days after birth. The mother, considered ritually unclean after giving birth, was also purified on this same day. But the visit of Mary and Joseph to present the infant Jesus is unique, marked by an outpouring of prophecy. Simon and Anna testify that a light has come into the world and that salvation is at hand. We honor the link to ancient tradition as we celebrate the Presentation today, but we also appreciate how Jesus not only fulfills but surpasses all the traditions of his time and place. Here at last is the perfect offering.

Be a healing light

The historical details of Saint Blaise's fourth-century life in what is now modern-day Turkey are lost in the shroud of the centuries, but the tradition of his healing powers endures. The healing of throat diseases is what is most ascribed to him. When Blaise was imprisoned during a persecution of Christians, he apparently healed a choking boy with the aid of candles that lit his dark cell. On another level, the enduring tradition speaks to the ongoing need for healing that we all share. Whether it be a physical ailment or a wounded soul that needs tending, say a prayer today to Saint Blaise, the keeper of the flame.


